MONSIGNOR D. J. GILLIS

Not often are we called upon to chronicle the death of such an old and venerable alumnus as he who passed away on March 14, Monsignor D. J. Gillis. For several years he held the distinction of being the oldest alumnus, having entered St. Dunstan's in 1860. He was ordained in May, 1870, and thus completed almost sixty-one years in the priesthood. With the exception of the last year and a half, which were spent in retirement, these years found him engaged in very active service. He was pastor successively of St. Andrew's, St. Peter's, East Point, and finally of Indian River where he spent the last forty years of his active life. Besides this last parish he had a mission at Kensington, and, until fourteen years ago, attended also Summerfield. He was a man of extraordinary physical perseverance; even up to the time of his retirement in 1929 he continued to say two Masses on Sunday for the accommodation of his scattered parishioners. Being one of the priests of pioneer days, his accurate memory could recall many happenings and hardships of years long past. His recollection of names and of faces was the marvel of all who knew him. His death marks the passing of a simple, kind, devoted priest, whose years of ministry was a link connecting the present with the past.

It is our sad duty to chronicle here the deaths of two of our alumni members: namely, that of Gregory Harquail at Saranac Lake, N. Y., and that of James E. King at Silverton, B. C. The former, during his term at St. Dunstan's excelled in mathmatics. After leaving here he purposed studying law but, owing to failing health, he was unable to continue his studies. Mr. King, formerly of Rocky Point, P. E. I. was, previous to his death, a member of the teaching staff of Silverton High School. To relatives and friends, Red and White extends sympathy.

Dr. Leo B. McKenna, who is a graduate of St. Dunstan's and McGill Universities, has recently received the appointment of Pensions Medical Representative for this district. He was formerly on the instruction staff of the Royal Victoria Hospital and the Montreal General Hospital.
