

Saints Re-Enter I. S. H. L., Prove Strong Competitors

Saint Dunstan's Varsity Hockey Team re-entered I.S.H.L. competition this year after a one year leave of absence. Although Saints managed only one victory in five starts, they have not shown any lack of ability. Their play has had an air of professionalism, and indeed, with a bit of luck, they could have won most of the games they lost. There teams had a big advantage over the Saints in that they had already played several games before the Saints played any. However, the S.D.U. games have provided some of the most thrilling hockey in the I.S.H.L. this season.

Saints opened their season on November 25, hosting the Penguins. Tingley opened the scoring at 10:37 of the first period, but Jack Kane evened

matters minutes later. In the second period, three unanswered goals gave the Penguins a 4-1 advantage. The teams then traded tallies in the third with Gillis scoring the second goal for the Saints. The final score was 5-2 in favour of the Penguins.

On December 2, the Cape Traverse Evinrudes handed the Saints their second defeat by a score of 5-2. The teams were tied 2-2 at the beginning of the third period. Then the Evinrudes came to life and scored 3 unanswered tallies. Saint scorers were Dick Manz and Dick Tingley.

The Saints returned to action after Christmas on January 3 against the Parkdale Royals. Saints, given little or no chance of defeating the Royals, threw a real scare into the pace setters. After falling behind 2-0 after three minutes of play, the Red and White squad fought back fiercely. They took the lead 4-3 in the second period before 3 Royal goals within 5 minutes put the Royals out of reach. The final score was 8-5.

The fourth game saw the Summerside Crystals edge the Saints 3-1 in a fast, hard-hitting game. The Crystals scored one goal in each period, while Manz scored the Saint's lone tally at 10:51 of the third session. Saints had a wide margin of play, especially in the second and third periods when they missed several good chances to score. Walsh had to make 36 saves as compared to 26 by Pollock.

The Saints' first win came on January 10, when they defeated the Evinrudes 5-2. After a

For the first time in years,

this squad has a fine chance of winning the Maritime Championship. They have already defeated U.N.B., and although they lost an exhibition tilt to Richer by 11 points, Saints did much better than Mt. A., who lost to the same club by about 30 points. The biggest threat from Nova Scotia are St. F.X. and Acadia, but here again, Saints have already shown that they can hold their own. In a game between Acadia and St. F.X., Acadia won by a single point. Saints lost an exhibition tilt to St. F.X. by two points but were without the services of Frank Garrity and Don DesRoches.

Hockey is also attracting a lot of attention. Fans are quite satisfied with the Varsity's showing in competition so far, although lack of ability around the opposing net has cost us some games in I.S.H.L. play. Especially gratifying was Saints 7-4 triumph over Mt. A. in the first intercollegiate tussle.

Where Are Those Cheers?

What has become of our cheerleaders and college cheers which are so characteristic at most other universities? Visiting teams must find it most curious indeed, that St. Dunstan's does not have (?) or at least does not make use of cheerleaders and college cheers to support their teams in their efforts for victory. Saints Upset Mounties 7-4 In Collegiate Tilt

Saint Dunstan's Varsity Hockey Team defeated Mount Allison Mounties 7-4 in the opening game of the Maritime Intercollegiate Hockey League, Saturday, January 13, at Mt. A. Playing without the services of last year's "Fabulous Five," MacIntyre, Henderson, Noreena, Houghton, and Bryson, Mt. A. fell behind at 1:06 of the first period and never came ahead.

Bob Marshall and Dick Manz paced the local boys, each accounting for two goals and one assist. Marshall's first goal, at 1:06 of the first period, was the prettiest of the game. He picked up a perfect pass from Billy Sherry, and rifled it home on a fine shot to the left side. Other S.D.U. marksmen were MacIntyre, Tingley, and Sherry. Desjardins, McKeowan, Hoffman, and F. MacDonald scored for Mount Allison.

The Saints held the edge in play most of the time, and out-shot Mt. A. in each period. Saints outscored the Mounties 4-3 in the opening frame, added an unanswered tally in the second, and then added two more in the third while Mounties managed only one.

The key play of the game came at about the mid-way mark of the second period. Mt. A. got a breakaway, but Pollock played the onrushing forward to perfection. The score at the time was 4-3 in Saints' favor. Had Mt. A. scored, the result of the game could have been much different. Shortly afterwards, Tingley gave the Saints a 5-3 lead.

Saints were minus the services of Vince Mulligan and Darrell Pollock, who are ineligible for intercollegiate play. This made things particularly tough on George Trainor, who played an outstanding game on defense. However, George received fine assistance from rookies Jim Peddle and Colin McMillan.

Eight penalties were assigned four to each team.

Saints Down UNB 86-75 Lose To Ricker 73-62

The S.D.U. basketball team officially opened its 1962 Intercollegiate season at the Alumni Gymnasium on January 12. The Saints got off to a tremendous start, taking a thriller from the more experienced University of New Brunswick team by a decisive 86-75 score. U.N.B. had played seven games previous to this Intercollegiate opener. The U.N.B. squad had dropped three of these tilts to American clubs, but had won the four played against neighbouring New Brunswick teams.

The game started off slowly but momentum picked up as the game progressed. U.N.B. quickly acquired a 6 point lead and maintained it throughout most of the first half. Saint's shooting was a little erratic, causing them to miss several good chances to score. The half-time score saw U.N.B. still holding their 6 point margin, the score being 39-33. Saints committed 16 fouls, U.N.B. 15.

The Saints hit hard in the second half with Serois, Heine,

Sassi, Garrity, and DesRoches doing an excellent job. The Saints gradually closed the gap, and once they took the lead, there was no turning back.

Len Sirois, spearheading the Saints' attack, was high scorer of the night with a total of 34 points. Heine, Carrity, and DesRoches not only showed their ability from the floor, but under the boards, they were invaluable. Doing an outstanding job in his debut with the Saints was Bob Francour, playing great defensive ball, was much more effective than the figures indicate. Players in double figures were Sirois-34, Heine-15, Sassi-10, and Frank Garrity-10, for the Saints. For U.N.B., McLennan had 26, Labronte 13, and Morgan 14.

The following night, the Saints lost an exhibition tilt to Ricker College of Houlton, Maine. The loss was no disgrace as Saints fought valiantly against the much taller, and more experienced visitors. The

11 point spread at the end of the game was one of the smallest that Ricker has won by this season. They held a 10-1 win-loss record.

A very fast match saw the Saints trailing throughout most of the first half by eight points. The superb ball handling of captain Wright, and the 'dead-eye' of guard Pound made for a powerful nucleus of the Ricker Team.

After a half-time score of 36-28 in favour of Ricker, the Saints came out strong in the second half. With eight minutes remaining the Red and White

team managed to close the gap to 57-55. However, the Bulldogs forged ahead again in the closing minutes to win the tilt 73-62.

High scorer for the game was Pound of Ricker with 27 points. Other Bulldogs with double figures were Wright with 16, and Coon with 14. High scorer for the Saints was John Heine with 15. John, a freshman from New York, played tremendously well both offensively and defensively. Other Saints holding double figures were Len Sirois with 14, Frank Garrity with 12, and Don DesRoches with 10.
