Despite the unfavorable weather conditions a fairly large crowd made their way to the Arena on Tuesday, February 18th, to witness the initial games of the City League. By a toss it was decided that the Abbies and Connaughts should play first and it was not till 9.30 that the Vics and Saints came on the ice. This match was a fine contest, lively all through and clean. The Vics started off with a rush and before the Saints discovered they were playing hockey Rodd and Burns, with their usual lightning speed, broke through our defence for a tally each. Then our boys settled down. Some end to end rushes followed, and Callaghan and Ingraham combined the former scoring number 3. The Saints now took their turn in the tallying and things became interesting; after a good run Perry notched No. 1 for the "Red and White." After the "Bully" the Vic forwards came down the ice in a pretty combination play but they failed to connect, the Saints in turn taking the puck from behind their own goal, went the full length and Dougan slammed in the second. McQuarrie a few seconds later after one of his sensational rushes succeeded in evening matters up. The play continued fast and exciting until the end of this half and the score stood 4-3, Prowse putting in one just as the bell sounded.

Although the second period opened with fast work on both sides it was not until after ten minutes that Ingraham by a long shot from the wing found the net. Sweeney, bound not to let the "Champs" too far ahead duplicated the trick from his side. Rodd who had been closely watched during the game got away and landed another for his team. Burns shortly after repeated. Toward the close Sweeney and Ingraham put in one each leaving the final count 8–5.

James McMillan as referee and Ivan Reddin as judge of play handled the game to the satisfaction of both teams.
