ATHLETICS

In athletics where a championship is at stake there may be found high excitement, tension, and most often, drama. Too often championships bring bitter disappointment. Truly, the champion should be acknowledged, but the result of a championship match should never breed contempt. It should be remembered that the loser, no less than the winner, has also done his best. In doing one's best there must be satisfaction. In hockey and basketball, St. Dunstan's have competed in playoffs for six championships during the past semester. The titles at stake were: Island Intermediate "A" Hockey, N.B.—P.E.I. Intercollegiate Hockey, Island Basketball, City Juvenile Basketball, Provincial Senior Intercollegiate Basketball, and Provincial Intermediate Intercollegiate Basketball. In their quest for these titles these athletic teams were successful in winning the Island Intermediate "A" Hockey League Championship, and the Provincial Senior Intercollegiate Basketball Championship.

SENIOR HOCKEY

The St. Dunstan's senior hockey team won the Island Intermediate "A" Hockey League championship by edging the Charlottetown Abbies 7—5 in a two game, total-goal, semi-final series, and by taking the first two games of a best out of three series from Summerside Crystals by scores of 6—4 and 10—4.

Schurman scored three for Summerside, while Kelly got the other.
