Amendments to the Saint Dunstan's Students' Union Constitution have resulted in the standing committee chairmen on the council being reduced to five. These five chairmen have now been granted the right to vote which was denied them under the unamended constitution. They will now be elected by the organizations with which they are concerned instead of being appointed by the Executive, as was the case this year.

By extending the vote to these committee chairmen, the voting membership of the Students' Union is increased from nine to fourteen. The original nine votes were held by the four members of the executive and the five class presidents.

However, in the event of a conflict between this Parliamentary Guide and the S.D.U.S.U. By-Laws, these By-Laws shall take precedence. The Council may alter or delete any part of this guide.

Rings: It was recently resolved by the Students' Union that the official ring of Saint Dunstan's University shall be 10K gold with a red smooth stone in which a gold delta shall be encrested at the top of the stone. The crest of Saint Dunstan's University and the Provincial crest of P. E. I. shall appear on alternate shanks. The ring adopted is based on the style of the graduation ring of 1964.
