## WHITHER GOES THE FINES?

An unusually heavy amount of fines were levied in the past two weeks by the Deans of Residences in Dalton, Main and Memorial Hall. The penalties were assessed for infraction of the rule on permissions as recorded on page 20 of the student handbook.

Hardest hit were the students of Memorial where, on one corridor, the fines totalled 135 dollars. For two students the penalty represented the third time they were "caught" and as a result, they were expelled from residence.

These rules were defined during the past summer in a complete shakeup of the rules in residences. At present, Seniors have no check ins whatsoever, while the remaining students must be in their rooms by 11:30 on weekdays, and on 12:30 Saturday night. There is no check in as such during the week, but the deans and the prefects have the prerogative to make spot checks at their discretion.

As far as the money collected from the fines are concerned, there is some doubt as to where the money goes. The general consensus is that the money is forwarded to the Canadian Mission Society. However, in the last two weeks there have been rumors to the effect that this is not so, unless, of course, cheques are made payable to that Society.

One prefect, who refused to be named, said he felt the money went to pay the salaries of the prefects, amounting now to several hundred dollars a year.

One source stated that the money was sent to the Missionary Educational Fund, and cited the Diocesan record as the proof of the contention.

In order to clear up any misunderstanding on this matter, might not it be only fair for the prefects to explain the amount collected through fines and where the money has gone in the past, and to where it will go in the future?

## S. D. U. DEBATORS CAPTURE THE MARITIME CHAMPIONSHIP

The St. Dunstan's University Debating Society, with three unanimous decisions to its credit, has won the Atlantic Intercollegiate Debating Championship. As Atlantic Champions, the St. Dunstan's debators will represent the Atlantic Region in the Canadian Dominion Finals to be held in Winnipeg March 3.

There are nine universities represented in the AIDL, each of whom debates three times. In the event of two or three teams winning the same number of debates, a play-off for the Atlantic title would be necessary.

Debating the resolution "Apartheid is a desirable policy for the Republic of South Africa," Senior Arts student Ken MacInnis and Junior Arts student Charles McMillan scored St. Dunstan's first unanimous decision by beating UNB law students George Chaisson and Pat Sheppard. The SDU debators supported the negative side of the resolution before a home audience of more than 600 persons.

Seniors Dave Campbell and Wes MacAleer won a second unanimous decision for St. Dunstan's by defeating St. Thomas University in Fredericton. The SDU debators supported the negative of the topic: "resolved that Communist activity be made a criminal offense in Canada."

## ELECTIONS TO BE HELD

The annual elections of the officers of the Saint Dunstan's University Students Union will take place sometime around the middle of March. According to the constitution, these elections are held within the week of the semi-annual General Body meeting which takes place on March 9. A probable election day would be Tuesday March 15.

Although official nominations do not take place until a week before the actual voting, rumor has it that there will be a large slate of competent candidates contesting each of the four officers. The Red and White wishes good luck to each candidate and looks for a hard-fought clear cut campaign.

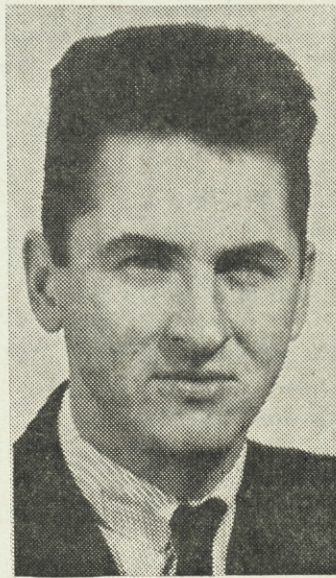

The purpose of this affair is to help inform potential college students just what goes on around our campus at Saint Dunstan's.

One girl and one boy will be chosen to represent each high school on the Island. These representative students will be chosen by their high school principal. It is not necessarily the most intelligent students that will be chosen, but rather those who demonstrate a keen interest for attending university, and possess the ability to convey to their fellow students their findings at S.D.U.

Doug Richard, president of the S.D.U. Honor Society, has outlined a tentative schedule for this day.

- 10:00 - 10:30 a.m. Orientation
- 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. Displays in the Biology, Chemistry and Physics Labs.
- 11:30 - 12:15 a.m. Workshop Period. Members of the faculty and students discuss different aspects of university life.
- 12:15 - 1:30 p.m. Free dinner to be provided for the visiting students.
- 1:30 - 2:30 p.m. A tour of the S.D.U. campus including a peek at our new Science Building.
- 2:30 - 3:30 p.m. Students meet with the Administration to discuss entrance requirements, choice of courses, etc.
- 3:30 - 4:15 p.m. A visit to the Coffee Shop and a meeting with the heads of the various organizations on campus.
- 4:15 - 5:05 p.m. Attendance at a regular class at Saint Dunstan's.
- 5:05 - Small snack and then "au revoir"

It should be noted that this day does not replace the regular "Open House", which will be conducted by the faculty later in the year.

## ASSURED OF TIE

With all hopes of an Atlantic title resting on their shoulders, Junior Arts students Tom McMillan and Philip Macdonald came through with a convincing win over the King's College Quintilian Society, assuring the St. Dunstan's Debating Society at least a tie for the Atlantic Championship. Mr. McMillan and Mr. Macdonald upheld the negative side of the resolution "that French Canadian Nationalism will lead to the disintegration of Canada." A home crew of more than 400 was in attendance.

As the only university with three wins to its credit, St. Dunstan's will automatically represent the Atlantic Region in the Dominion Finals at Atlantic Champions. Ken MacInnis and Dave Campbell will leave Wednesday, March 2 for Winnipeg where they will meet the University of Saskatchewan to compete for the Dominion Title. They will uphold the negative side of the resolution "that Canada's role in a troubled world must be that of a middle road." Six teams will vie for the Dominion title, two from each of the Western, Central, and Atlantic Regions. The winner of the Canadian Finals will be chosen by a panel of three judges from the results of the three individual debates.

Mr. Campbell has been officiating for the past year as President of the Atlantic Intercollegiate Debating League, and has two years of debating experience. Mr. MacInnis also has two years experience, including a unanimous decision over St. Francis Xavier last year. Accompanying Mr. Campbell and Mr. MacInnis to Winnipeg will be the hardworking and "hard driving" coach and moderator of the Debating Society, Rev. Dr. F. W. P. Bolger.

The Dominion Finals are being sponsored by the Canadian Union of Students and the Coca Cola Company of Canada.

## Canadians Barred From Talent Show

The Foreign Students Society at Saint Dunstan's University will present a night of International Talent on Sunday, March 6th, 1966. This affair will consist of various performances by the foreign groups attending Saint Dunstan's.

Asked about the show Bruce Garrity, president of the Foreign Students Society, replied that he felt pleased with the operations of the society this year, and expects a large turnout for this coming event.
