

The Most Reverend Joseph Anthony O'Sullivan D.D., was recently appointed Archbishop of Kingston by His Holiness Pope Pius XII. His Excellency, formerly Bishop of Charlottetown, was installed in his new office on April 25, 1944.

Archbishop O'Sullivan, born in Hamilton, Ontario, on November 29, 1886, was educated in St. Mary's School, and St. Jerome's College, Kitchener. Having attended Grand Seminary, Montreal, he was ordained to the priesthood at Hamilton in 1911. Distinguished as a priest and pastor in his native city, Archbishop

O'Sullivan was named a Domestic Prelate by Pope Pius XI in 1924. Within a year he was made President of St. Augustine's Seminary in Toronto.

On May 7, 1931, Monsignor O'Sullivan was consecrated Bishop at Hamilton, and on May 18th of that year he took up his office as Bishop of Charlottetown. His labours in this diocese have extended over a wide field. His efficient work and zeal found expression in the promotion of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, in his encouragement of social work, and in his support of a program of Adult Education carried on by St. Dunstan's College, to mention only a few of his many interests. Most worthy of recognition, especially by all those attached to St. Dunstan's, has been his interest in the College. The promotion of higher education in general was one of his great objectives.

Archbishop O'Sullivan takes with him the prayers of the students that God may continue to bless him in his work.

He will be succeeded as Bishop of Charlottetown by Most Reverend James Boyle, formerly pastor of Holy Redeemer Church, Whitney Pier, Sydney, N. S.
