IN MEMORIUM

On the seventh of January the soul of Rev. Joseph Rooney was called away by the Angel of Death. Father Rooney was borne at Iona fifty-four years ago. At the age of sixteen he moved to Cherry Valley where he attended the District School.

He entered St. Dunstan's College and, after graduating in 1912, entered Grand Seminary at Quebec. He was ordained at Vernon River in 1916, after which he spent two years on the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's College. In 1918 Father Rooney went overseas as a chaplain in the Canadian Army. After the war he again joined the teaching staff of St. Dunstan's.

In 1921 he became parish priest at Morell, where he carried on his labors until December 1940, when he moved to Cardigan. Here he remained until his death.

-REQUIESCAT IN PEACE-

By the death of Father John E. O'Brien on January 10th St. Dunstan's lost a true son and a highly respected alumnus.

Father O'Brien was born at Fort Augustus, P. E. I. He attended St. Dunstan's College for several years and then entered the Seminary. After his ordination of the Priesthood, he took up his duties in Tecoma, Washington, where he carried on the work of Christ until his death. During the summer of 1941 he returned to Prince Edward Island, where he visited the scenes of his youth. May his soul rest in peace.
