At the last meeting, of the St. Thomas Literary and Debating Society, held before the Christmas Holidays, a motion was carried whereby the society resolved itself

On January 24th, a formal opening of the house was held. The speech from the throne was read by His Excellency Rev. Lawrence Smith. The speech was one of the best that was ever heard in the house; the grave tone of its opening paragraph, wherein God was thanked for the many benefits he had conferred upon the country, was continued throughout.
