Good luck, Joe. Your sound philosophy is needed in an unsound world.

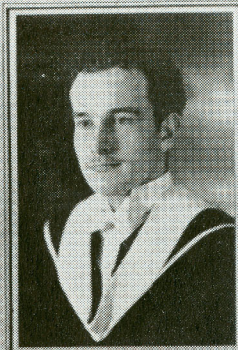

CLARENCE ANDREW COADY*"One of those well-oiled dispositions which turns on the hinges of the world without creaking". — Longfellow*

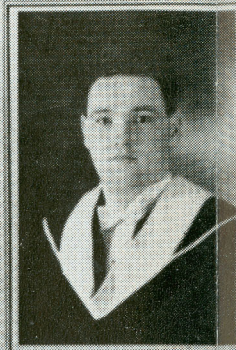
