SAINTS SLAY TIGERS!

Saturday, November 10, St. Dunstan's wrapped up the '62 football season with a 39-25 victory over the Dalhousie Tigers.

The Saints opened the scoring early in the first quarter. Out of a second and eight situation on the Dalhousie twenty-three yard line, Mike O'Brien, running behind good blocking, went around left end for six points. The Saints failed on the convert attempt.

The Tigers seemed to be on the way back after Dalhousie's Ward intercepted a St. Dunstan's pass on his own thirty-two yard line and ran it back to the Saints' twenty-one. Several plays later, however, the Tigers fumbled and Frank Garrity recovered the ball for the Saints. From here, it was only a matter of minutes before quarterback Ripley started on his own forty-three and went across for St. Dunstan's second touchdown of the game. Dave O'Brien kicked the extra to make it 13-0 for the Saints.

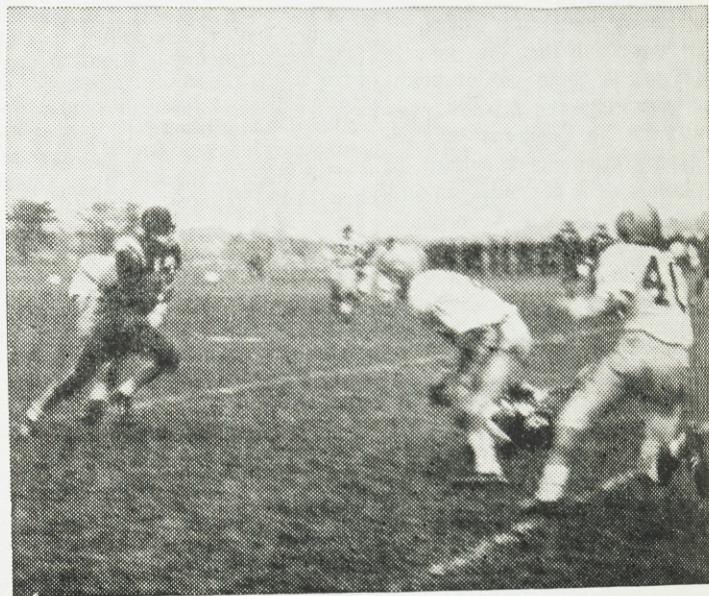
