## S.D.U. Tops P.W.C., Seniors Take Corpuscule Cup

Des Duffy, NFCUS Chairman announced recently that the Senior Class won the inter-class competition at the bi-annual Blood Donor Clinic. The seniors, standing true to their challenge, won the competition with an 88% average.

The Corpuscule Cup (on the local level) was held jointly by this same class and the graduating Class last year. Both achieved 100%.

The University as a whole exceeded the expected quota of 25 with a total of 285 pints.

The Juniors came in second in the competition with an average of 78%, while the Sophomores and Freshmen had 75% and 54% respectively.

Again keeping in the spirit of competition, S.D.U. challenged a Prince of Wales College to a "Corpuscule Battle". Miss I. Arsenault, Provincial Commissioner of the Red Cross, stated at the conclusion of the Clinic that St. Dunstan's had won the competition.

A treat in music is again in store for S.D.U. students. The University band has scheduled a concert for Sunday, April 29 in the gymnasium with the hope of making this concert the best yet.

During the first semester the band presented a concert in conjunction with the Glee Club. However, this time the Band will present its own and only full performance.

The Band has held two practices a week during this semester and though reduced in size since the beginning of the year, has maintained a high standard during practices.

A feature of the concert will be the fact that the program will contain dance selections which will make up over half the concert. The mainstay of the brass band, its traditional marches, will not be forgotten.

The St. Dunstan's Band is under the direction of Lt. Charles MacGregor of the Canadian Army Reserve, and conductor of the Prince Edward Island Regimental Band. This is Lt. MacGregor's second year as director of the University Band.

## Seniors To Do Lay Mission Work In Mexico

The work will involve chiefly the building of a school, and other carpentry work, and this is expected to keep them occupied throughout the summer.

## Quigley, Foster To NFCUS Summer Seminar

"The University in Canadian Life" will be the theme of the fifth national NFCUS seminar to be held at Carleton University from September 1 to 8. Distinguished speakers from Canada, the United States, and possibly England and France, will address the 150 delegates from virtually every Canadian University.

The seminar theme will be divided into such topics as: "The Development of Canadian Universities," "Aims of University in the Community," and "Problems of University Freedom."

Bob Quigley, Junior Science student from St. John's Newfoundland and Paul Foster, Sophomore Commerce will attend the seminar for S.D.U. Mr. Quigley is Yearbook editor and Mr. Foster is Assistant Sports Editor of Red and White.

## Commencement Of Library Date Uncertain

No date has yet been set for commencement of work on the proposed Bishop Kelley Memorial Library.

According to the University rector's office, tenders have been called for April 18, at which time an examination of the tenders received will be held.

The new library will be named after the Most Reverend Francis C. Kelley, who died in 1948. Formerly Bishop of Oklahoma City and Tulsa, U.S., Bishop Kelley bequeathed his library to his Alma Mater.

## Local NFCUS Foiled In Plans But Still Undaunted

Although not very much has been heard about NFCUS on the campus during the past months, the local chapter has not been entirely idle. Several projects were planned, both on the local and national levels, but so far, none of them has materialized.

One of the national projects planned was the visiting of local high schools, explaining to the students some of the aspects of University life, and providing information to those contemplating entrance to University. However, as this series of visits conflicted with a similar mission by the Registrars Office the project was postponed until a later date this year.

Attempt was made also to obtain a concession for a weekly educational programme on radio, but the Educational Committee which handles such programs decided against the NFCUS project, and so the proposed plans had to be dropped.

A move was later made to sponsor talks at the University by professional men who are experts in their field as it was felt this would be of immense value to students who had no definite plans for the future. However, this attempt encountered official opposition and the idea had to be scrapped.

However, despite these setbacks, NFCUS still intends to initiate further plans in the furtherance of Education, Human Rights, and Canadian Culture—the three basic aims of NFCUS.

On the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Priesthood, he donated \$20,000 to St. Dunstan's to form the nucleus of a fund for a new library building.

Estimated cost of the building is \$400,000.

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## ROSEMAY TO SUCCEED DOLAN AS EDITOR

Armand DesRoches To Be Managing Editor And Ellen Reddin To Take Over Associate Slot

Armand DesRoches has also been on the staff for the past two years, holding the positions of Circulation Manager and Assistant Managing Editor. John Mullen, a newcomer to the staff, is presently a second-year Commerce student.

The members of the Editorial staff were all formerly associated with RED AND WHITE in various capacities. Dave Ellsworth, the new Feature Editor, was formerly the Advertising Manager and is a member of the Junior class.

Douglas M. McLead, Paul Foster and Dorothy Morris, who will be taking on the Editorships of News, Sports and Co-ed, respectively, are all members of the present Sophomore class, and previously served in the Assistantships to the posts they will now hold.

Serving as assistants to the Editorial staff will be Mary Lou Cremin and Phillip Mullen in the News Department; Jo-Anne Vatalaro on Features; Walter Buote on Sports; and Marie MacLean as Assistant Co-ed Editor.

In the Business Department, Pauline Macdonald, RED AND WHITE typist for the past two years, will take over the Typing Department and also serve as Executive Secretary; Sandy Cameron will be the new Advertising Manager, while Tom Robbins will serve as Circulation Manager and assistant photographer. Douglas E. MacLeod and Dan Kinch will be assistants to the Managing Editor, and Gordon Harris, formerly the Yearbook Photographer, will join RED AND WHITE as its official Photographer.
