Early in October, Father Gauvin, a missionary priest of La Societe des Missions Etrangees de la Province de Quebec, spoke to us about his experiences as a missionary in the Far East. He also showed a religious film entitled "A la Croisee de Chemins".

A week later, Father Fournier of the White Fathers addressed us in the Assembly Hall concerning the important Catholic Missions in Africa. He also showed a film which summarized the achievements of the White Fathers in converting Africa from a Dark Continent to a Christian one.

Then on November 2, we were inspired by a lecture delivered by Mrs. Catherine Doherty (Baroness de Hueck). Mrs. Doherty is the foundress of the Friendship Houses which are located in many of the eastern cities of this continent. She lives in Combermere, Ontario, near Ottawa. She gave a most provocative address to us on Catholic Action. It is seldom our privilege to meet a person so full of the Faith. She is a real apostle. Her message should be an incentive to many of us to take up the torch of Catholic Action as members of the lay apostolate.

Another missionary priest in the person of Father Kirby, S.F.M., Scarboro, celebrated the Student's High Mass on Sunday, November 4. He also spoke to us on religious vocations. Father Kirby served six years as a missionary in San Domingo, West Indies.

REQUISCAT IN PACE

On July 10, 1951, the Diocese of Charlottetown lost one of its most distinguished clergymen in the passing of Right Reverend A. A. MacAulay, '87, D.P. His death has removed an exemplary priest and an outstanding scholar. For many years Monsignor MacAulay served as parish priest at St. Peter's Bay, and as well was a member of St. Dunstan's College Board of Governors. We as students owe much to Monsignor MacAulay because of his solicitude for St. Dunstan's during his life. Let us remember him in our prayers.

Reverend Francis Butler, '14, died at Tampa, Kansas, on August 8. He served in the dioceses of Dodge City and Witchita, Kansas, for over thirty years. His death deprives St. Dunstan's of another honoured alumnus.

Dr. J. D. MacGuigan passed away on September 1. As an interested and valued friend of St. Dunstan's, Dr. Mac-Guigan was held in high esteem. His passing has deprived this Province of one of its most distinguished laymen.
