

The season of winter sport which has just drawn to a close has been, in every respect, a successful one at St. Dunstan's. The two great winter pastimes, skating and hockey, always popular with Canadian youths, received their full quota of adherents from the ranks of our students. At the first appearance of Jack Frost the energetic rink committee began their work, and within a few weeks had a splendid sheet of ice at our disposal. The first skating took place about two weeks before Christmas, but no regular hockey practice was held until after the holidays.

Immediately upon the re-opening of College for the second term, first and second teams were organized. Father McKenzie was unable to act as coach this year, but we were fortunate enough to procure, in his stead, Mr. Jack Gordon, whose ability and experience as a hockeyist were soon shown to good advantage, so much so, in fact, that the Saints entered the City League with a more formidable aggregation than they have had for some

years past.

There were four teams in the league this year, namely: The Victorias, Falcons, Second Abbies, and St. Dunstan's. The Saints tied for first place in both sections of the league, winning two games and losing one in each. However, owing to the fact that the boys would be unable to enter the finals for the Island Championship, on account of examinations, they withdrew from the play-offs altogether. The following is a more detailed account of the games played.

Vics—1 S.D.U.—O

The Saints played their first league game on Saturday, January 25, when they met the Vics at the Arena before a small gathering of fans. The hockey displayed was not of a very high standard, but this may be attributed to the fact that the ice was heavy and the puck persisted in rolling, making passing and shooting a matter of chance.

In the first two periods play was about even but neither team succeeded in scoring. Midway in the third period Lawlor of the Vics put a long shot past McDonald for the only counter of the game. The Saints worked

like Trojans for the remaining few minutes to even the score, but they could not penetrate the Blue and White defense.

was almost impregnable.

The first score of the evening came a few minutes after the opening whistle, when Fraser broke through the Red and White line and eluded McDonald in the net. The Falcons were not to hold the lead long, however, for immediately after the face-off Hughes, taking a pass at his opponents' blue line, placed the puck behind O'Neill to tie the count. This score was followed in quick succession by two more, the first by Doucette and the second by McCabe. Just before the period ended, Doucette, who was playing stellar hockey, scored again. In the second period individual rushes predominated on both sides, and although the play was as fast as that displayed in the first twenty minutes, neither team scored. The third period was more or less a repetition of the second. The Falcons played four men up for the greater part of the time, but McDonald easily handled all shots that came his way. McCabe made the only score of this session when he skated through the opposing forwards and beat O'Neill with a well-placed shot.
