### SENIOR FOOTBALL

As college activities were resumed for 1936, so also was the task of rebuilding a football team. Under coach Fr. McGuigan's experienced eye, new material was placed in vacancies. After much practice Fr. McGuigan presented his 1936 machine.

The league this year was composed of the Nomads and Saints, with the Island Title at stake. Weather conditions, however, did not allow the deciding game

and the 1936 winners will not be proclaimed.

The football season was officially opened at the C. A. A. A. grounds on October 13, 1936, when the Saints lost to the visiting Mt. Allison Team by a score of 13-8. A very large crowd of football fans saw Mayor Turner open activities by kicking off. With a heavy wind in their favor, the Mounties at once took the offensive. They realized their first score on a penalty kick, Johnstone booting the pigskin over the bar. The same player, receiving the ball from a scrum directly in front of the uprights, drop-kicked it over the bar. Johnstone's toe had given Mt. Allison a 7-0 lead. A few minutes before the end of the first half, a snappy backfield play ended when Bigelow touched the ball down behind the Saints' line. The half ended 10-0 in favor of Mt. Allison, Robinson failing to convert.

Running and kicking with the wind, the Saints in the second half assumed the role of aggressors. High kicks

carried the play into the visitors' territory. John A. MacDonald broke the goose-egg for the Red and White warriors by crossing the line on the far corner of the field. Higgins added two more points with a beautiful convert from an almost impossible angle. A few minutes later Saints made it 10-8 when Trainor crossed the line. A long broken-field run saw MacFarlane plunge over the line for the final score. The attempt to convert failed and the score remained 13-8 in favor of Mt. Allison.
