Father Rooney. They emphasized the fact that physical and mental development must go hand in hand, and that knowledge gained at the sacrifice of health and strength is useless. The students were urged to take part in games not only to secure their proper physical development but also to acquire self-control. alertness of mind and confidence.

THE OPENING OF DALTON HALL.

Undoubtedly the most important event that has been chronicled in these columns for a long time was the opening of Dalton Hall, the magnificent gift of Sir Charles Dalton to the cause of education. This splendid structure which will give a new impetus to the rapidly increasing scope of the University, was blessed and formally opened on Thursday September 25 th.

The Papal Nuncio, accompanied by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, Bishop Morrison of Antigonish and a large number of clergy arrived at ten o'clock. The students who were drawn up in two lines on either side of the driveway received the Papal Delegate's blessing, kneeling.

On his arrival an address was presented to his Excellency, expressing veneration towards His Holiness and containing thankful reference to Sir Charles Dalton for his generosity. The Papal Delegate, in reply to the address, spoke in very commendable terms of the work of the University and granted the

students a holiday in honor of the event.

Attired in his pontifical robes, he then proceeded to bless and formally open the Hall. A very eloquent and impressive sermon was preached by Bishop Morrison of Antigonish. Taking his text from St. Matthew, "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father who is in Heaven," he sketched the early history of the church and showed how she had always encouraged and protected with fostering care the Arts and Sciences. He emphasized the necessity of a good sound Catholic education not only for those who aspire to become God's holy priests, but also for those who are preparing themselves for various spheres of the secular world. He concluded by appealing to the students to take advantage of all the opportunities that were thrown in their way and not to waste the most precious years of their lives.
