REV. DR. EDWARD WALKER

St. Dunstan's has lost another of her outstanding alumni by the death of Rev. Dr. Edward Walker, which occurred at Rollo Bay, P. E. I., on October 15, 1932. The late Dr. Walker was born at Launching, P. E. I., on May 10, 1853. After having attended Prince of Wales College for two years, he enrolled at St. Dunstan's, from which place he graduated at the age of nineteen years. He then entered the Grand Seminary at Quebec, and after a brilliant course there, was ordained at Charlottetown on July 10, 1877. After a year spent on the teaching staff at St. Dunstan's, Dr. Walker was appointed parish priest at Rollo Bay, a position which he filled most capably for almost fifty years. The virtuous lives of his parishoners, as well as the large number of vocations to the religious life and to the priesthood with which his parish has been blessed are a testimony of Dr. Walker's faithfulness to his assigned task. Moreover, there still remain many indications of the efficient manner in which Dr. Walker promoted the material welfare of the people of his parish. It is due chiefly to his encouragement and example that the district in the vicinity of Rollo Bay enjoys its present distinction, that of being one of the most progressive and prosperous farming districts of P. E. I.

During the three years previous to his resignation, in 1926, as parish priest, ill health had necessitated Dr. Walker's gradual relinquishment of parochial responsibilities, and from the time of his resignation until his death he resided at Rollo Bay with his successor, Rev. A. L. Sinnott. A thorough Christian gentleman, a student and a scholar of the highest rank, a leader who greatly aided the spiritual and material prosperity of this province, and a sincere, holy, priest of God has been called to his eternal reward. May he rest in peace.

It is our further sad duty to chronicle the death of Gerald Dalton, a graduate of '20, which occurred in Florida during the past summer. To relatives and friends, *Red and White* extends sympathy.
