THE SMUG MINORITY:

AN ANALYSIS

Editor's Note: The following is not a judgment of Mr. Berton's thesis, although judgment may lie implicit in Mr. Dorsey's literary tone and structure. It is intended to be an analytic presentation of Mr. Berton's thesis.

Mr. Berton in his book THE SMUG MIN-ORITY, proposes that several contemporary social standards may be myths, and it is his intention to challenge them. In this text, he presents a sweeping survey of Canadian society, and sociological beliefs and patterns of activity. It appears, aibeit not explicitly stated, that his only self-imposed limitation is to present no articulate vociferated conclusions or alternatives, but to opt for the Socratic method of intellectual animation.

His major thesis is that society today is "...in essence, a serf society run by a smug minority of well-entrenched overseers." This smug minority is a "...small, in-bred, establishment of business and political leaders who have a vested interest in maintaining the STATUE QUO." He ascribes the attribute of smugness to this minority because he concludes, believing all evidence points to this fact, that this minority of overseers honestly and sincerely believe that public planning is detrimental to society, and that all members of society or possessed of freedom. Mr. Berton maintains that the smug minority, in their search for Mammon's cave, are Medicean

tyrants whose oppressive instrument is a dying ethic.

This dying ethic is a complex and fatuous mythology, in whose pantheon are lodged religious folklore, mythic sexual morals, and long outdated patriotism. Some of these myths, he presents, are the following: "A woman's place is in the home"; "Satan finds more mischief still for idle hands to do"; "Too much security kills initiative"; "Government planning is a denial of freedom"; "It's your own fault if you're poor"; "Hard work is the backbone of the nation"; "Anyone can work his way through college"; and "Private property must be sacrosanct." All of these myths, he asserts, are open to challenge and he declares "it is the purpose of this book to challenge them." In juxtaposition to these he presents aphorisms that are credulous predictions of the future — "Political parties may be obsolete"; "Work, as we know it now, may be obsolete"; and "Cash may be unknown."

A secondary and exigent consideration of his thesis is freedom and the insufficiency of it... "freedom from want and sudden disaster...freedom from foolish toil...freedom from ignorance." Freedom in these terms, he says, is viewed, by the smug minority, from the apex of their established pinnacle, as anathema, and those who seek a society which these qualities are catalytic agents whose intended metamorphosis shall result in a chaotic society.

Mr. Berton then gives consideration to each of these three conceptualizations of in-act freedom, as they are viewed today, by the smug minority, and proposes queries about future possibilities.

In regard to "freedom from foolish toil" it is his thesis that "...society would benefit if it could eliminate entirely the kind of pointless drudgery which serves to degrade human beings; and that people so employed would be better off if they were given unlimited time, with pay, to do what they want; drink beer, argue in taverns, lie in the sun and stare at the clouds, get an education, work in their gardens and write poetry." He prophesies an age of leisure, during which citizens shall have a choice between work and leisure, and adjudges the hippies, who the sacerdotal smug minority regard as blasphemous, to be the heralds of the new age. He maintains that the citizen of the age of leisure shall not respect work, activity done to support's one's self and one's dependents, as an enhancement to the human spirit, the prevalent belief today.

"Freedom from want and sudden disaster," Mr. Berton says, is the phantasy of the poor. The myths of toil, endorsed and perpetuated by the smug minority, are the tethers which prevent our society honestly confronting poverty. If we were to cut our mythic hawsers and float free we would take cognizance of the fact that poverty is self-perpetuating, as it is treated today, and that freedom from present eleemosynary attitudes and freedom from the "folklore of motherhood" would cause us to become aware that government and corporate planning combined with investment in our greatest natural resource, people, would yield greater dividends than the smug minority could ever anticipate procuring.

In his discussion of "freedom from ignorance," Mr. Berton states, that it is one of the thesis of his book that "...the country must now be prepared to accept a totally free educational system." Contrary to popular belief, he points out, with statistics for verification, that all are afforded equal opportunity for post-secondary education, and that, indeed, a very SELECT percentage possess the opportunity. This fact is resultant from an inter-causation of environment and finances, and its rectification is inherent in "freedom from want and sudden disaster" and "freedom from foolish toil."

Consistent with Mr. Berton's method, this author posits one question — Does Mr. Berton adjudge the incorrect side of man's dichotomy, to wit, the intellect, to be the dominant force in man?
